6 **WHEREAS**, CC Hancock United Methodist Church, located in Delaware County, was 7 founded in 1956 and has a long and proud history of ministering to the community in 8 Springfield, PA.

10 **WHEREAS,** the church conference of CC Hancock, voted on March 10, 2019 to 11 discontinue the church; and

WHEREAS, the District Superintendent has recommended the discontinuance of CCHancock and transfer of membership to Lima UMC.

WHEREAS, the remaining congregation of CC Hancock and the Superintendent has
 recommended that the property be sold and conference Trustees distribute the
 proceeds following the recommendations continued herein;

WHEREAS, the remaining congregation request the Conference Board of Trustees to allocate 1/3 to the conference Trustees; up to 1/3 of the sale proceeds to the Chester: St. Daniel's New Church Start on the former Trinity Campus in Chester, PA; and up to 1/3 to the creation of Church Development under the direction of the EPA Cabinet.

 district superintendents, and the district Board of Church Location and Building; and all
 property Disciplinary requirements have been complied with; and

 Retired Clergyperson Registration rate for retired clergy not serving a local church or
 United Methodist agency;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the retired clergy registration fee shall not 20 exceed the cost of meals for the event.

3 Resolution to Enable Automatic Enrollment in the UMPIP

4 Presented by The EPA Board of Health Benefits, Coleen Painter, President

- 6 **WHEREAS,** The Board of Pension and Health Benefits is concerned with the number of 7 clergy who are not prepared for a comfortable retirement, and
- 8
- 9 **WHEREAS**, reports from Wespath confirm that we are often very late to enroll clergy at 10 appointment changes or eligibility changes due to incomplete or unsubmitted forms, 11 and
- 12
- 13 **WHEREAS**, we recognize the importance of saving for a secure retirement, and
- 14 **WHEREAS**, Wespath has created a process for conferences to approve the automatic 15 enrollment of eligible clergy into the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan,
- 16
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2020, all clergy appointed to a local church, charge, or conference elected entities who are not yet enrolled shall automatically be enrolled in the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan at a 1% contribution.

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that after 1/1/2020 all clergy will automatically be enrolled at a 1.0% contribution rate when they become eligible to participate in the UMPIP.

- AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that clergy will retain the right to opt out of the plan by completing and submitting a UMPIP contribution election form.

4 (CRSP) for the Year 2020

7 **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Adoption Agreement for the Clergy Retirement Security 8 Program shall be applicable to the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference and, 9 unless another date is specified below, shall be effective as of January 1, 2020. The 10 Clergy Retirement Security Program shall be the base retirement plan for the clergy persons under Episcopal appointment including deacons and members of other 11 12 denominations serving at the conference, church, charge, conference responsible unit, 13 conference controlled entity including clergy on medical leave receiving Comprehensive 14 Protection Plan (CPP) disability benefits of the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual 15 Conference in accordance to the plan adoption agreement beginning on January 1, 16 Clergy persons on medical leave and not receiving Comprehensive Protection 2020. 17 Plan (CPP) disability benefits are not eligible to participate in CRSP.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that on January 1, 2020 the ministerial pension rate for past service prior to January 1, 1982 shall be set at \$502.00 and the personal contributor's annuity derived from pre-1982 contributions shall apply toward the payment of the participants formula benefit;

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that the surviving spouse benefit shall be 70% of
 the participant's formula benefit;

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Pension and Health Benefits is authorized to make annual deposits at the end of each calendar year as required by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits for the purpose of funding for past service prior to January 1, 1982.

3 **Resolution Concerning Retiree Health Care**

6 **WHEREAS** the future unfunded liability for Post-Retirement Health insurance as 7 recorded in the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference (EPA) annual audit was \$24 million 8 as of December 31, 2012 and has decreased to just under 10 million on December 31, 9 2018 through the changes made over the past 5 years; and

WHEREAS we are charged by Wespath to submit annual plans for funding of this futureliability for Post-Retirement health insurance; and

14 **WHEREAS,** 98% of our retirees were enrolled into the group plan offered which is the 15 most costly plan for retirees and more insurance than the majority of retirees need; and

- WHEREAS, we have continued to have customer service issues with our current
 provider over the last few years; and
- 20 **WHEREAS,** Wespath offers a service called Via Benefits which assists retirees in 21 enrollment to the plan best suited for their needs, and would provide seamless transition 22 from our HealthFlex for active clergy to the Retirement Insurance; and
- 23

WHEREAS a study by Wespath revealed that lowering our subsidy by 17% would allow
 93% of our retirees to have the same or less out of pocket expenses, and would assist
 in lowering our future liability cost while "resetting" the subsidy start point; and

- 28 **WHEREAS** these outsourced options will provide retirees with expert one-on-one 29 assistance provided through Wespath and more medical plan flexibility and options; and
- 30
- WHEREAS The Group Insurance Committee has authorized investigation and due
 diligence on this option; and
- 33
- 34 **WHEREAS** most retirees would see a reduction in the cost of their health plan choice 35 for 2020;
- 36

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Pension and Health Benefits
 shall enroll with Via Benefits effective January 1, 2020, with an Annual Election period in
 October and November of 2019;

41 **AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference is 42 authorized to contribute an annual subsidy, reduced by 15% over past years, per 43 retiree, payable monthly, in the following amounts:

\$2,550 for each Pre-2003 Retiree with at least 20 years of enrollment in the EPA
 Plan.

- 46 \$1,870 for each Post-2003/Pre-2015 Retiree with 20 Years of enrollment in the EPA
 47 Plan
- \$1,020 for each Post-1/1/2015 Retiree in the Pre-Funding Plan with contributions
 paid in full, with 20 years of service in The United Methodist Church, once they
 transfer their contribution balance to the conference.
- No contributions will be made for members over the age of 40 who elected not to participate in the prefunding plan, but they will be able to utilize the enrollment assistance of the Medical Exchange Program.
- \$600 for each age 67 or above Post-1/1/2015 Retiree under the age of 40 as of 1/1/2015, with 20 years of service in the United Methodist Church.
- \$335 for each Retiree age 65-67 with 20 years of service in the United Methodist 57 Church.
- Members who retire with less than 20 years in in the United Methodist Church, but more than 10 years, will receive 5% less contribution for each year of service less than 20.
- No contribution will be made for members who have less than 10 years of service with The Eastern PA Conference, but they will be able to utilize the enrollment assistance of the AmWins group.

6 **WHEREAS,** the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the 7 "Church"), of which this Conference is part, has in the past functioned and continues to 8 function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code 9 section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the 10 Church ("Clergypersons");

11

WHEREAS, the practice the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active
 Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross
 compensation;

15

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons are
 considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to retired and disabled
 Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service;

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its
 predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental/housing allowance
 for retired and disabled Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference.

23

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under <u>The Book of Discipline</u> of The United Methodist Church ("the Discipline"), which includes all such payments from Wespath during the year 2020 by each retired or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designed as a rental/housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

30

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the pension and disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, 32 33 annuities, or funds authorized under the Discipline, including such payments from 34 Wespath and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from 35 benefits accrued under a Wespath plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the 36 Discipline, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or 37 that a retired or disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, 38 annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the 39 Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the 40 41 Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a 42 benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such retired or disabled Clergyperson's 43 pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

44

45 **NOTE:** The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergyperson's 46 gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal 47 Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the least of: (1) the 48 amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the Clergyperson's employer or 49 other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing 50 resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the Clergyperson to 51 rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including 52 furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

Resolution relating to the "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors" motto of the United Methodist Church.

5 **Presented by Rev. Jimmy Montgomery and Cochranville United Methodist** 6 **Church.**

- 7 WHEREAS, the doctrinal standards of the United Methodist Church are based on the
- 8 Bible, as listed in Part II of the Book of Discipline (1) John Wesley's Explanatory Notes
- 9 Upon the New Testament (2) the Standard Sermons of John Wesley; (3) the Articles of
- 10 Religion of the Methodist Church and (4) the Confession of Faith of the Evangelical
- 11 United Brethren; and
- 12
- WHEREAS; Wesley wanted his notes to emphasize the biblical message in a way that inspired and challenged readers and believed that God speaks through the scriptural text to move the reader to love and serve God and neighbor, and
- 16
- WHEREAS, the writings of the founder of Methodism, John Wesley, are saturated with
 biblical ideas and quotations, and his commitment to teaching the Bible at every
 opportunity, and
- 20

WHEREAS, the current motto of the United Methodist Church is incomplete for the Christian apart from Holy Scriptures; i.e., to have an "open heart" (John 3:16, Romans 10:9-10) to have "open minds" (Romans 12:1-2), and "Open Doors", (Rev. 3:20), and

- WHEREAS, Article IV of the Evangelical United Brethren Confession of Faith is printed in and part of the Book of Discipline reads; "We believe the Holy Bible, Old and New Testaments, reveals the Word of God so far as it is necessary for our salvation. It is to be received through the Holy Spirit as the true rule and guide for faith and practice. Whatever is not reveled in or established by the Holy Scriptures is not to be made an article of faith nor is it to be taught as essential to salvation.", and
- 31
- 32 **WHEREAS** the Book of Discipline states our calling is "to spread **scriptural** holiness 33 over these lands" (para 63) and,
- 34
- 35 WHEREAS, the current motto omits the most important element of Wesley's quadrilateral of (1) Scripture, (2) tradition, (3) reason, and (4) experience; for United 36 Methodists, Scripture (Open Bibles) is the primary source and standard for Christian 37 38 doctrine, while tradition (Open Hearts) is the witness of development and growth of the faith through the past centuries, reason (Open Minds) the individual Christian brings to 39 bear on the Christian faith discerning and cogent thought, and experience is the 40 individual's understanding and appropriating of the faith in the light of his or her own 41 life.(Open Doors), scripture is listed first for a reason and the filter through which 42 tradition, reason, and experience must pass to be Christian. 43

6 **WHEREAS**, the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference has had a stated 7 commitment since 1996 to work toward dismantling racism within the Annual 8 Conference, its churches, and the communities it and its churches serve; and

10 **WHEREAS,** training for dismantling racism has been essential for carrying out this 11 commitment, transforming the lives and ministries of both clergy and laity who have 12 experienced it; and

13

WHEREAS, effective training and work toward dismantling racism requires that training
 be kept vital, up to date, and comprehensive, including an emphasis on active follow-up
 using what people have learned; and

WHEREAS, the Healing the Wounds of Racism Core Accountability Team, acting in accord with the 1996 "Plan toward the Elimination of Racism within the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference," has developed effective resources and experience for conducting training for dismantling racism; and

WHEREAS, experience has led to recognition of the depth of the transformational
 journey for individuals and institutions learning about and acting toward dismantling
 racism, leading to the need for ongoing training for dismantling racism; and

WHEREAS, the Healing the Wounds of Racism Core Accountability Team has worked
together with the Commission on Religion and Race to provide one-day workshops
supplementing the "Changing Racism" workshops; and

31 **WHEREAS,** the Commission on Religion and Race has taken on dismantling racism 32 responsibilities that preclude their further involvement in such workshops; and

34 **WHEREAS,** the Healing the Wounds of Racism Core Accountability Team has worked 35 with the Visions, Inc. facilitators to increase the dismantling racism impact of the 36 introductory workshop;

37

When associate members are members of the 96 conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote at clergy session on 97 matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy (635.1) Affiliate 98 clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters 99 except the constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to the General, 100 jurisdictional or central conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and 101 conference relations of clergy. d) Full-time and part-time local pastors shall have the 102 right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, 103 election of clergy delegates to the General and jurisdictional or central conferences, and 104 matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. When local pastors 105 are members of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote 106 at clergy session on matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy 107 (635.1) Local pastors who have completed course of study or an M. Div. degree and 108 have served a minimum of two consecutive years under appointment before the election 109 may vote to elect **and may be elected as** clergy delegates to General and jurisdictional 110 or central conferences. 111 112

- WHEREAS, In February 2019, the General Conference adopted petition 90016 from
 Wespath, which added a new ¶1504, sub paragraph 23, AND
- 9
- WHEREAS, The General Conference also added ¶2553 to *The Book of Discipline*. This
 new paragraph allows a local church to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church
 "over issues related to human sexuality" until 2023. Among other things, it requires a local
 church's disaffiliation be "memorialized in a binding Disaffiliation Agreement," which must
 be consistent with certain provisions set forth within the paragraph. And,

- WHEREAS, this new paragraph states that the local church or charge seeking to change its relationship with the United Methodist Church shall contribute withdrawal liability in an amount equal to its pro rata share of any aggregate unfunded pension obligations to the annual conference. And,

- WHEREAS, The General Board of Pension and Health Benefits shall determine the aggregate funding obligations of the annual conference using market factors similar to a commercial annuity provider, from which the annual conference will determine the local church's share. And,

- WHEREAS, Wespath continues to provide the most current pension obligation for The
 Eastern PA Conference for the Pre-1982 Plan, the Ministerial Pension Plan, and the
 Defined Benefit portion of the Clergy Retirement Security Plan, AND

- WHEREAS, the Eastern PA Conference Board of Benefits has met to evaluate the most
 equitable methodology for determining the pro rata share for each church, AND
- WHEREAS, the calculations for the remittance fund charged to each church is based upon a three-year average of the church's Grand Total Paid and factors in any special appeals approved by CCFA and Cabinet,

 disaffiliation from the Eastern PA Conference, the pro rata portion of the pension liability

WHEREAS, in February 2019, the General Conference amended the Book of Discipline to include a new ¶ 2553, which provides a limited path for local churches to disaffiliate from the denomination for reasons of conscience regarding a change in the requirements and provisions of the Book of Discipline with regard to issues of human sexuality; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 2015-17 and the new Book of Discipline ¶ 2553 were not designed to coordinate with one another and may either conflict or cause unanticipated implementation problems, when read together.

19 **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that any church that seeks disaffiliation in accordance

with the new Book of Discipline ¶ 2553 shall not be subject to Resolution 2015-17.
